Dear editors of Connection Sac Central, Perhaps you can use some words of Sac Central members who live in The Netherlands



Sac Central in The Netherlands.

My name is Dick and I was born in the SDA-church. Till I was about seventeen years old I always went with my grandmother, mother and sister to our church each Sabbath. The childhood in our church was the best time a child can wish. Children's Sabbath school, SDA mandolin orchestra, the choir, selling magazines for the mission, camp, events around the harvest, Tabitha (Dorcas) evenings and visits to prisons, retirement homes, and hospitals.

As a child I thought it would always stay that way and it would never change. However, puberty came, my father died and I left the good old path of our precious Lord. Fortunately I did not neglect the study of economics. After some dark years I met in our little village Marion, a school teacher. She lived not far from my house but I did not know her. We never spoke about the Bible, church or religion.

Her father even was an atheist. Years went on and there was commercial success in Holland and Germany.

After a long period of working seven days in a week we sold the business. It was on my birthday, the 4th of July, a Saturday. Marion asked me what I wanted to have for my birthday. She was very surprised when I asked her to accompany me on that special day to the SDA church in Amsterdam that I had visited when I was a child. So we went to that church after approx twenty years, and at the door there stood a pastor (we call it a brother) who exactly knew who my sister was because she once was a friend of his daughter. Later he visited us at home and he gave me Bible lessons. At a safe distance Marion listened to our conversations, but slowly her interests became into bloom.

#### **Coming Home**

I started to study theology at our SDA academy and at the university of Amsterdam. I was baptized in 1988 and for us it is still a wonder that Marion gave her heart to our Lord too, in 1989. A fruitful period of working for the Lord started in Amsterdam. A brother of the General Conference called me at home and asked me to meet him in a hotel in Amsterdam. He asked me to work for the church in Russia but that was not possible due to health problems of Marion.

The SDA church in The Netherlands changed. It was not the church of my childhood and the times of our baptisms anymore. The liberalism, ecumenism and the shortage of preaching about the Spirit of Prophecy made us " searching orphans" without a congregation. We prayed and prayed. Then God led us to Sac Central. In 2009 was the first sermon we saw on Internet. It was like coming home. We heard all the things we strongly believed in. Then in 2011 we had contacts with the office of Sac Central.

The first mail we received was from Melissa Martin. Words of her so warm and tender, direct from her heart and inspired by the Holy Spirit. In the last years we build up a very close friendship with Melissa and her family and they are very precious to us. With Harold White , Dan and Cathy Salyers too, we have very good contacts and that is something to be very thankful for.

God is good. It is a blessing to be members of Sac Central. We will stay loyal to Sac Central and hope to see all members soon in heaven.

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## Sharing God's Gifts To Reach The World For Him

ess than three months after Sacramento Central church began fundraising \$75,000 for the purchase of new media equipment, we reached the goal and surpassed it! It was one of the fastest fundraisings ever for our church, according to Pastor Chris. Now the total offering received toward the Media Ministry is getting closer to the \$100,000 mark. That's the new goal, said treasurer Alfredo Pacheco in the last church business meeting on January 14.

In addition to the generosity of the church collectively donating for this ministry, one of the events that contributed to this project was the art sale on November 2, 2014. Hundreds of paintings by Dorothy Angell were sold in a silent auction, and raised about \$6,000 that day. The sales are still going on and all proceeds go to our media ministry.

## Dorothy Angell, a gifted artist, teacher, and friend of God

Excerpts from the handout of the Art Sale By Marilee Angel Walker, the artist's daughter.

Mom was born with good genes for art. She started drawing as a young child and would often get into trouble in school, as she would rather "doodle" than listen to the teacher.

Her career in painting started when my childhood friends all wanted to paint and I asked her to teach them. She taught my friends how to paint, then their mom's wanted to paint... and their friends... and friends of friends...

My father turned our garage into a painting studio for my mom, allowing her to work from home. She taught as many as 3 classes a day, up to 4 days a week, with 7-10 students in each class – and this is how my college tuition was financed. It was important to her to keep the cost of classes reasonable so that anyone could take her class, and there were times when she provided free classes to someone who couldn't afford it.

Many students said my mom's class was "better than a psychiatrist." It was a place that was happy and creative, allowing everyone to put away their cares for a morning or afternoon. Many wives of medical students at Loma Linda University have taken classes. Some of her students are even teaching painting.

My mother had a God-given talent and she was able to paint any genre – ocean, landscape, portraits, animals--anything! Not only that, she could also paint on anything, often painting on fabric, wood, cabinet doors, glass, corian blocks, ornaments, barrels, or ceilings. She even painted a wall in the pediatric unit at Loma Linda University hospital. She also had the gift of being able to paintquickly and it was not unusual for her to complete 1-2 paintings a day. As you can imagine, our house had paintings not only in the studio, but also in the closets, under the beds and behind the couches. When we had no more hiding places, we had a sale! Our friends and family were often invited to

"pick a painting" to take home with them, and I have friends who tell me how much the paintings have meant to them over the years. She definitely had a generous heart!

I learned from my mom to see beauty in everything, from a flower to a bunch of grapes, an old door or a barn. She always said, "God must have had a lot of fun creating all these beautiful things!"

My dad was an important part of my mom's career, and he supported her each step of the way. When he retired, he would make lunch for her while she was teaching and when class was about ready to be over, he would stroll



out to the studio and start picking up trash, a nice little reminder that it was time for everyone to go. My father was supervisor of the grounds department at Loma Linda University, and he loved a beautiful yard and flowers. He would often pick some flowers and bring them home for my mother, and although many of us would have just put them in a vase and enjoy them, my mother would always paint them.

After my father passed away, painting classes were the best medicine for my mom, as it allowed her to keep busy. The many students she had taught throughout the years supported her through this difficult time. She had had some of the same students for over 30 years, and they had now become her friends. My mother taught oil painting until 6 months before she passed away at the age of 83. Her attention to detail never faded until the last week of her life... What a gift she had!

After my mother passed away, I didn't know what to do with all of her paintings, as they meant so much to me. I have many happy memories of watching my mother paint throughout my life. She had asked me about 4 months before she died, what I was going to do with all of her paintings--and not wanting to address it, I just said "I don't know - maybe I will give them away!" I have had these paintings in my home, unsure what I wanted to do with all of them. I recently felt impressed to "give them away" to Sacramento Central and donate the money from their sales to the Church's media program. My mother and father were life-long Seventh Day Adventists, and I am sure they would both have loved knowing this money will help support a media ministry that will allow others to learn about Jesus.

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## Thrift Store: striving for success in 2015

"Homeless people walk into the store with nothing and walk out with clothes on their backs," said Richard Anger, YNTS steering committee chairperson.

That's one of the store's goals – to be a ministry to the neighborhood. This primary objective is continually being achieved. According to Buddy Harper, Central Community Service leader, the store offers free literature, CD's, DVD's, and educates the public about the Sabbath. It's also a training center for welfare recipients to learn a trade, and helps rehabilitate injured people to overcome their problems



and become productive.

What the store is needing now is more support from the members of Sacramento Central church. The first three months after the store opened in September 2012, YNTS was very successful, with many customers and volunteers. But things started to slow down.

"This past year has been a hard one financially," said Harper.

The financial issues are setting back the other goals of the store: to be a self-sustained ministry, and even providing funding for other Central ministries that need financial support. Pastor Chris hopes



that Your Neighbor Thrift Store will do well financially to achieve this purpose. He also envisions the store model being used as a template for the opening up of more Adventist owned and operated thrift stores across the conference.

"I'm so glad the church operates Your Neighbor Thrift Store," he said. "It provides some of our members with work, it ministers to our community and the homeless, it gives our church recognition in the area, and is another avenue for the distribution of truth-filled, Christ-centered books and magazines to the masses. Although 2014 was a financially difficult year for the store, I'm optimistic about its future."

The goal for 2015 is to grow the business by advertising, and involving our church and the surrounding SDA churches in this ministry, according to Harper.

Lavinia Sitima, from the Woodside SDA church, is already involved. She lives close by and makes regular trips to the store.

"The store is nice and clean. I find a lot of good things here. The stuff is good and cheap, and I love the veggie roast! It's closer getting it here than going to the ABC," she says.

She is referring to the new selection of vegetarian foods offered in the store in partnership with the Adventist Book Center in Carmichael. They are sold for the same price and there is a large selection.

"Some church members, especially from the Fiji group, are pretty regular," said store manager Teri Harper. "But mostly our customers are the neighborhood people."

"We would like to see more Central church members," said Anger. "We are trying to do everything we can to enable the store to be more successful, as well as be a ministry to our community. We are always open to suggestions for improvement."

## Cornbread

(serves 9)

1 1/2 c. soy milk 1 1/2 T. lemon juice 1 c. cornmeal 1/2 c. unbleached all-pur-



#### Chocolate Mousse (serves 8)

1 c. semi sweet, non dairy chocolate chips

1/2 c. soy or other non-dairy milk

1 package Mori-Nu brand silken Tofu (firm or extra firm)

1/3 c. sweetener of your choice (maple syrup can be used)

1/2 t. vanilla or coconut extract

Combine the chocolate and non-dairy milk in a double boiler or heavy saucepan and melt using gentle heat and stirring often. By Karen Medeiros Photos by Marilee Walker

> Preheat oven to 425 degrees. Combine soy milk and lemon juice and let stand. Mix dry ingredients in a large bowl. Add the soy milk mixture and the oil to the dry ingredients and stir until just blended. Spread the batter into a nonstick or lightly oil-sprayed 8 inch square baking dish and bake for 25-30 minutes or until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean. Serve hot.

### Can't Believe It's Vegan Chili

(serves 10)

1/2 c. whole wheat pastry

3 T. Raw Sugar

1 t. baking powder

1/2 t. baking soda

3/4 t. salt

2 T oil

2 T. olive oil C. chopped onion C. red bell pepper 1 T. chopped garlic

Saute above ingredients in the olive oil for 4 minutes, then add the next 4 ingredients:

2 c. diced canned tomato with juice

1 t. dried grown sage

1 t. crushed red pepper

1 T. oregano

Bring to a boil: Cook until liquid is

Remove from heat.

Crumble tofu in a blender or food processor. Add melted chocolate and non-dairy milk, sweetener, and vanilla or coconut extract. Process until completely smooth, pausing the blender or food processor to scrape down the sides and under the blade as necessary.

Chill the mixture in serving bowls or if desired, a low fat graham cracker cookie crust or nut crust for at least 1 hour before serving. Garnish with fruit or mint.

Variation: Add a chopped banana to the food processor when you process the tofu and chocolate together.

reduced by half (about 2 the remaining whole minutes). Add 6 cups of vegetable stock. the mixture to a simple

Beans: 3 (15 oz) cans cannellini beans, rinsed and drained

2 (15 oz) kidney beans, rinsed and drained

Use a potato masher to mash two cups of the cannelloni beans and 1 cup kidney beans. Add the mashed beans and the remaining whole beans to the pan. Bring the mixture to a simmer: Cook 5 minutes. Add 2 cups chopped kale and simmer another 5 minutes until the kale is tender.

Add salt and pepper to taste.

I previously also worked in a bike shop and there I used my homeless ministry to help those in need with their bike repairs.

Joy: Speaking on Kris behalf, when he went to Haiti the people there also helped where they could. I'm a Deputy Director in Pathfinders at Sac Central, I used to lead Children's Choir but right now we're taking a break. I help with ARME





Photography, GYC for the Western region, and I've taken many mission trips for medical reasons. We also both help with the Acts of Mercy ministry. # How God's Love Affects Your Relationships

## PASTOR'S CORNER



**Pastor Chris Buttery** 

#### his year's church theme is, "Each One, Reach One." I'm excited about this, not because the words have a nice ring to them, or because we've cooked up a catchy little phrase like this. I get excited when I think of the terrific potential this has if we were to catch onto its significance. Think about this with me for a minute, if you would.

In Gary Gibbs' book, Winsome Witnessing, he shares some observations that are rich with importance. He asks us to compare an evangelist who baptizes 1,000 converts a day (which admittedly is somewhat challenging, but you'll see where this is going in a moment) to a person winning one person to Jesus the first year, then discipling that one person to win someone else the second. It would look something like this: Evangelist after one year – 365,000 converts; one person reaching one person the first year – 2 converts. Evangelist after two years – 730,000 precious people; two persons each reaching one person the second year – 4 precious people.

Not excited yet? I understand, but hang in there just a few more moments. On the twenty-third year the evangelist has 8,395,000 converts to Christ, while each one reaching one that year brings in 8,388,000 converts to Christ. The next year the "each one, reach one" method doubles the number the evangelist brings in, and by the twenty-sixth year the discipling method gathers in seven times the number of converts compared to those won by the evangelist! And all of this comes from just one dedicated follower of Jesus focused on reaching one person a year for Jesus.

Now can you understand why I see this years' theme as an exciting proposition? But before we see these wonderful results, we Photo: Aline Henda

need to individually think and pray about that "one" that the Lord has in mind for us to bring to Him this year. So who is he, who is she? Do you know? Has God put someone on your heart to reach for Him? If not, that's okay, He'll show you if you ask Him. If you know who that person is, then don't be afraid or ashamed, just be willing and make yourself available, and God will teach you what to say, when to say it, and how to say it in order to bring that "one" to Him.

Right now, let us simply pray the prayer Jesus taught us to pray. As we do, we will see what the Lord can do through one individual, who putting self aside, makes room for the working of the Holy Spirit in his or her life.
