Hebrew Prophets 1: Jeremiah 1-6, 14-17, 7-11, 26, 2 Kings 22-23, 2 Chron. 34-35

Read 2 Kings 22:1-2, 2 Chron. 34:1-7, and Jeremiah 1:1-4:4 – King Josiah and Jeremiah the Prophet

2.	In what year of Josiah's reign did Jeremiah receive his prophetic call? Where was Jeremiah		
	from? What stands out to you in God's call to Jeremiah?		
3.	What does the seething or boiling pot facing the north represent?		
	What does it mean when the enemy sets up his throne in the gates of Jerusalem?		
4.	Jeremiah 2 covers Israel's history of unfaithfulness to God. How does verse 13 sum it up?		
5.	What verse in Jeremiah 3 makes clear that many people were not experiencing a changed heart under		
	the early reforms of King Josiah? God makes stirring appeals to Israel. What two verses describe		
	what Judah must specifically do to return to God?

Read 2 Kings 23:31-24:1 and 2 Chron. 36:1-7 – King Jehoahaz and King Jehoiakim

3.	Where did God send Jeremiah to proclaim his message in Jer. 7? Where does Jeremiah
	indicate they have put their trust? What was to become of the temple?
4.	What are the saddest verses in Jer. 8? According to Jer. 9, where were God's people
	to be after Jerusalem was to be left in heaps "without an inhabitant"?
	How does 9:25-26 help give understanding for how a Judean was saved or lost compared to the
	heathen?
5.	What is the key point of Jer. 10:1-13?

	had Israel broken the covenant? What was to
	be the consequences for breaking the covenant with God?
7.	What did God reveal to Jeremiah in 11:18-21?
8.	How did the prophets, priests, and people respond to Jeremiah's message (Jer. 26) in the court of the
	temple? What example from history did the princes use to convince
	the people that instead they should listen to Jeremiah?
	What prince was named as one who protected
	Jeremiah? Is it possible that this prince was grandfather, father, or uncle of Daniel
	or one of his three friends?
